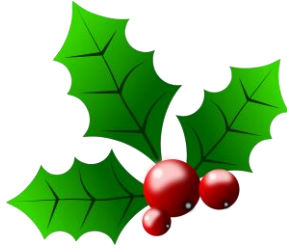

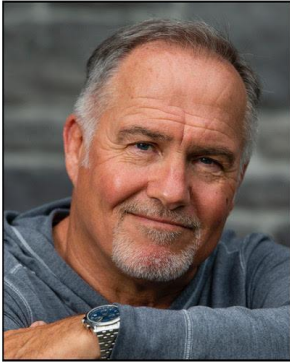
December speaker? Neil Crone is a humorous, down-to-earth human being – don't miss him!

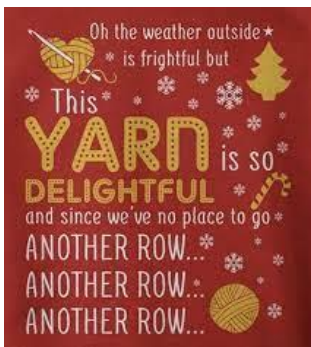


DC Wanderers:

Hotel Scam - ANYONE traveling should be aware of this one!

Typically, when checking in to your hotel you give the front desk your credit card (for any charges to your room) and they don't retain the card. You go to your room and settle in.

The hotel receives a call and the caller asks for (as an example) room 620 - which happens to be your room.

The phone rings in your room. You answer and the person on the other end says the following: 'This is the front desk. When checking in, we came across a problem with your charge card information. Please re-read me your credit card numbers and verify the last 3 digits numbers at the reverse side of your charge card.'

Not thinking anything wrong, since the call seems to come from the front desk you oblige. But actually, it is a scam by someone calling from outside the hotel. They have asked for a random room number, then ask you for your credit card and address information. They sound so professional, that you think you are talking to the front desk.

If you ever encounter this scenario on your travels, tell the caller that you will be down to the front desk to clear up any problems. Then, go to the front desk or call directly and ask if there was a problem. If there was none, inform the manager of the hotel that someone tried to scam you of your credit card information, acting like a front desk employee.

Meet your Fellow Members!

Meet Karen and Brian Thompson

Karen and Brian met as students – Karen in Nursing at The Hospital for Sick Children, and Brian in Mechanical Engineering at U of T. They married in 1970 and moved to Whitby in 1973.

Nursing offers numerous career paths and flexible scheduling to spark many an interest. As such Karen's career as a licensed registered nurse covered a variety of specialties including pediatric nursing, public health and community nursing (yes, they are different), discharge planning, psychogeriatric nursing and brain injury at Ontario Shores, in positions from the bedside to clinician, to management and program planning and development. To support this career after graduating from The Hospital for Sick Children, she studied public health at the University of Toronto and later completed a degree in health studies and health administration at York University. On the side she was a pioneer in the development of Hospice Durham in 1988 that eventually led to incorporation, and today is known as Hospice Services under the umbrella of VON.

Brian entered the nuclear energy field working for the former Ontario Hydro, earning his Professional Engineer

(P. Eng.) designation before switching careers and moving into Public Relations, where he spent the bulk of his career as an educator, ambassador, and advocate for Ontario's and Canada's nuclear program. He also earned his Commercial Pilot licence and worked part time as a flying instructor at Buttonville in the late 1970s.

Karen thoroughly enjoyed every position she held throughout her 43-year career, though much of it was part time. This flexibility allowed her to be available for her most cherished role, as wife and mom to 2 active kids. Volunteer work was equally important to her which led her to be active in camp nursing, brownies, the French immersion program as it was becoming an entity in Durham Region, and the local church. Today she serves as a board member for VON, and for Durham Hospice, a new residential hospice to be built shortly in Whitby.

Brian's favourite job was Director of Communications for the Canadian Nuclear Association in Ottawa, a role he held on secondment from Ontario Power Generation for two years. This offered a huge learning curve with the opportunity of serving the whole Canadian nuclear industry – medicine, mining, fuel production and energy, and Canada is a world leader in all of these sectors. After he ("small - r") retired, he produced industrial videos for ten years for major corporate clients, especially the Technical Standards and Safety Authority.

Now "large-R" retired, Brian leads an Alpha program – an online experience for folks who want to learn what Christians believe, and why.

In Rotary since 1980, he has held many senior leadership roles at various levels of the organization. The opportunities to meet great people and to give back to the community at the local and international levels have significantly enriched both of their lives.

Karen has joined him in several Rotary projects and fundraising events, but she branched off on her own with the work Brian's club (Whitby Sunrise) does in the Dominican Republic. Over the last two decades, she has donated her time and nursing knowledge to develop and operate an education and follow-up process for the installation and use of bio-sand water filters for the

poorest people in the country. That process continues today, monitoring and verifying that the filters are being used properly. Infant mortality and gastrointestinal infections are down significantly, skin rashes have disappeared, and the general level of health and hygiene have risen accordingly. Karen was honoured with a Rotary International award for her work. Karen and Brian are pleased to be part of Probus and enjoy getting to know others. They hope to do some more travelling once Covid is in the rear-view mirror, but they say that their greatest gift is their grandchildren, in whom they delight.
