Our March meeting is on St. Patrick's Day, so sport your best green attire! A Spring bonnet will work too!

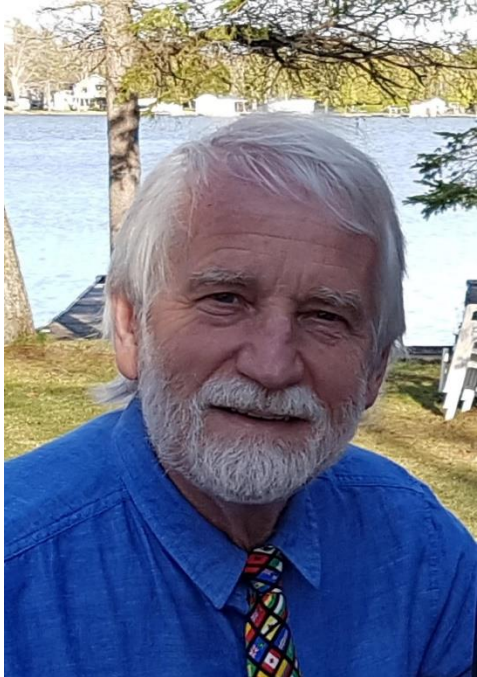

March 2022 Speaker: Lars Henriksson, Honorary Consul General

'Ontario and Sweden - Almost the Same!?'



There are many similarities between Ontario and Sweden; Size, Population, Economic Environment, Lifestyle to mention a few. Lars will discuss these and talk about the numerous roles he has played in trade links between Canada and Sweden and also Sweden as a tourist destination.

Lars Henriksson has undergraduate degrees from University of Gothenburg and Karlstad University in Sweden. He studied at The University of Alberta in Edmonton on a Rotary International Ambassadorial Scholarship, graduating with an MBA in 1979. In 1982, Lars returned to Canada for a position with The Swedish Trade Council in Toronto, eventually becoming Deputy Trade Commissioner. In 1991, Lars founded his own consulting firm, Norditrade Inc, specializing in international trade development between Scandinavian and North American companies.

Over the years, Lars has held numerous positions in the Swedish-Canadian community, including being Chairman of The Swedish-Canadian Chamber of Commerce. In February 2002, Lars was appointed Honorary Consul for Sweden in Ontario by the Swedish Government. Since 2016, he has been reappointed five times, as Honorary Consul General. As Honorary Consul Lars has worked to promote Sweden in the areas of culture, urban sustainability and to increase co-operation between Ontario and Sweden.

Lars has been an active member of the Rotary Club since 1986, serving various roles including President, Centennial District Governor, and RI President's Rep. Currently, Lars is a District Grant Sub-Committee Chair as well as a member of the District's Membership Committee. He is also involved in the international Club Visioning Program, including introducing the Program to Rotary Districts in Sweden and Norway.

Return to In-person Meetings Commencing April 21 2022!

Please note the following requirements to attend our first face-to-face meeting. These will mirror the requirements issued by our neighbouring Oshawa PROBUS Club.

1. Members must be fully vaccinated to attend our first meeting. This protocol will be reviewed on a month-to-month basis. Our members' safety and comfort levels are paramount.
2. Upon arrival, you will be required to **provide proof of vaccination**. Two tables will be set up at the entrance to the hall to accommodate this.
3. All attendees must wear a mask at all times, except when eating or drinking.
4. Please do not use the coat racks. Instead, take your coats with you to your seat.
5. Seating will be in table format, but there will only be 6 people per table, not 8 or more.
6. **Coffee or tea will not be served at this meeting**. If you require a beverage, we ask that you bring your own.
7. There will be a short break prior to our guest speaker but no food will be served.
8. Please do not attend if you have any Covid symptoms or been in contact with anyone with the virus over the last ten days.
9. **No guests** are to be invited to this first in person meeting.
10. **Please wear your name tag**.

Your management team looks forward to seeing you at the April 21 meeting. Doors will open no earlier than **9:30 AM**.

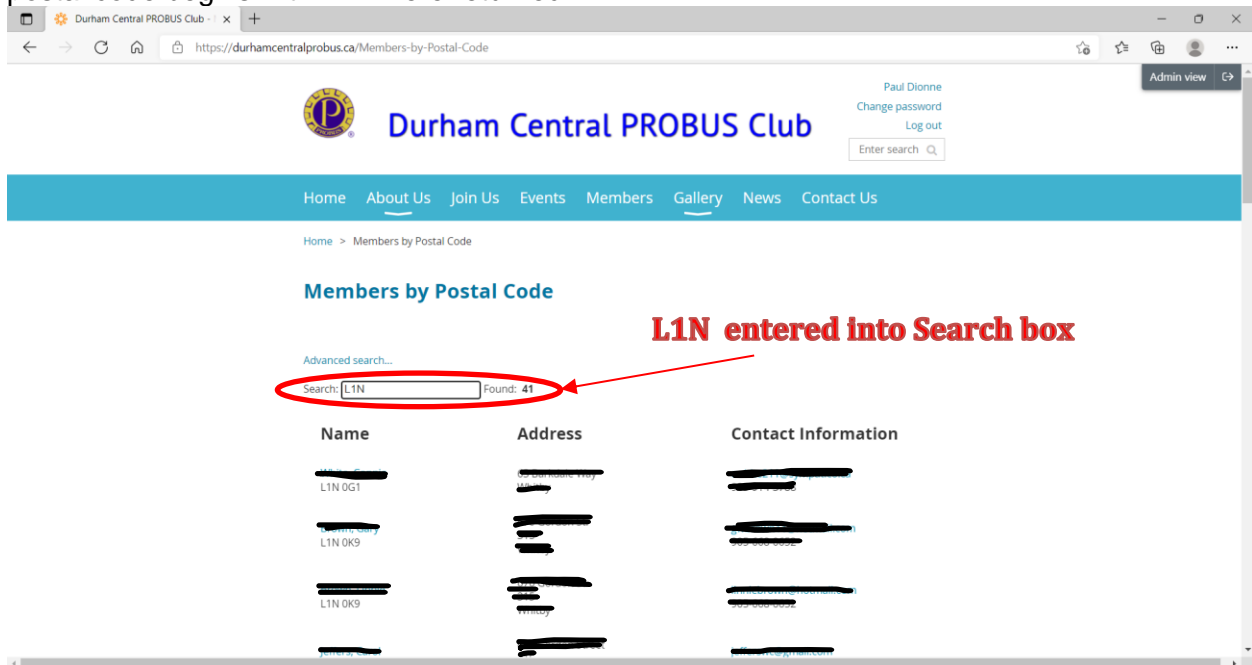

The Lives Near Me link will provide you with the ability to search for other members who may live in your neighborhood or near you, as the members' list is returned sorted by postal code. You can quickly narrow the list of members displayed by using the search feature on the first 3 digits of a postal code.

In the webpage example below, L1N was entered into the search box. 41 members whose postal code begins with L1N were returned

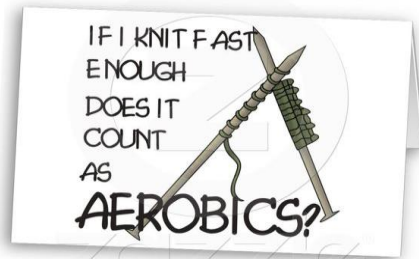
DC Wanderers:

Downhill Ski and Snowboarding Club

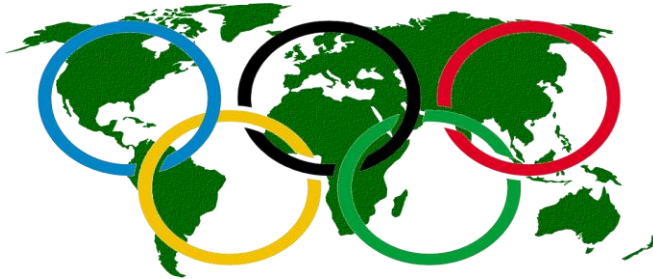
